**AMENDED ORDER**

Any motion to impose or extend the automatic stay under 11 U.S.C. § 362(c)(3) or (4) shall constitute a contested matter governed by Federal Rule of Bankruptcy Procedure 9014 and **use the title “Emergency Motion” if the motion is filed more than ten days after the case was filed.** The motion shall state (1) the specific creditors, if less than all creditors, against whom the movant is seeking to extend or impose the stay (the “Affected Creditors”); (2) whether the motion is intended to stop a foreclosure sale or similar action and, if so, the date on which such action is scheduled to occur; and (3) the specific change of circumstances in the financial or personal affairs of the debtor that has occurred since the dismissal of the next most previous case.

Any motion to extend or impose the stay filed more than ten days after the case was filed shall also state what efforts the movant has made to notify the Affected Creditors, including the address, telephone number, facsimile number and/or email address used to contact each Affected Creditors and the name of the person or persons with whom the movant has discussed the filing of the motion.

If the motion is filed more than ten days after the case was filed, the movant shall contact the Courtroom Deputy and obtain a hearing date, shall prepare a notice of the hearing and shall serve the notice on the Affected Creditors. A sample notice is available on the Court’s website. Such notice, along with a copy of the motion, shall be served on the Affected Creditors via facsimile, hand delivery, email, or overnight mail. The movant shall file the notice and a certificate of service on or before the scheduled hearing.
